Being a retired cop doesn't hurt when you're trying to convince strangers you can be trusted in their homes. The various house-sitting sites offer background checks on sitters to help ease the homeowners' worries, but not inviting a thief into their homes is only part of their concern. Of course, they want their house cared for and kept clean, but above all else, pet owners must know they have someone who will be kind to their furry children.
